Principal's Report

Before putting pen to paper for this article (or should I say fingers to keys), I took the time to read through the contents of this newsletter. What struck me were the connections that women associated with this school have built with each other, their local communities and the global community. From Averil Taylor meeting with our World Challenge girls in Thailand, our Prefects meeting the ex-girls at our Alumni function, or ex head prefect Lisa Dick chatting with Helen Clark in New York, these connections span both the globe and the generations.



I have recently completed an application for the Prime Minister's Excellence in Education Award. Otago Girls' High School has applied under the "Excellence in Engagement" category and our submission outlined the work we have done in recent years to achieve both equity and excellence among our students. The four areas of development outlined in the application were Belonging; Behaviour Response; Support for Learning; and Profile of Māori and Pasifika students. It is the area of belonging that has greatest relevance to the Alumni Association. Through the Association we have attempted to better engage with our community with the aim of enhancing the connection between the school and our ex-girls and between our current students and the history of the school. As can be seen by the article on the Alumni function on page 7, this has been achieved. Our first major social event was well attended and a lot of fun for all involved. The senior students who acted as hosts and tour guides on the night enjoyed the evening just as much their (sometimes) much more senior counterparts. Their pride in being part of such an illustrious organisation was a delight to see.

Our students continue to excel in their respective fields of endeavour and our ex-girls continue to return to the school to share their successes and lessons learned with our current students. At a recent school assembly Suzie Bates, a New Zealand cricket and basketball player, spoke to the girls about perseverance and dealing with disappointment. She is currently a member of the White Ferns NZ women's cricket team and was named the ICC Women's ODI and T20I player of the year for the 2015/16 season, the first player to achieve both awards. An outstanding sportswoman and ambassador for her school and country Suzie is an inspiration to the girls at school, among whom were two students who have just returned from playing in the New Zealand Women's Under 19 Volleyball team that competed at the Asia Volleyball Championships in Chongqing, China.


Major Sir John Larkins Cheese Richardson (1810-1878)


This portrait was unveiled by Miss Learmonth Dalrymple on 17 April 1884 and funded by subscriptions that she collected.



Kia ora koutou,

I am Kelsey Brown and I was Head Prefect at Otago Girls' in 2009. I studied at the University of Otago, and graduated with an LLB/BA in 2014. During my studies I volunteered at the Dunedin Community Law Centre and led a volunteer advocacy programme, supporting children and young people at a CYF Care and Protection residence. It was through my volunteer work that I started to see how I could build my career around what I'm most passionate about – ensuring Aotearoa's children and young people have a voice, and are empowered to achieve their potential. I was admitted as a Barrister and Solicitor of the High Court of New Zealand at the beginning of 2015, and accepted into the Ministry

of Social Development Social Policy Graduate Programme. I worked as a Graduate Policy Analyst, and then a Policy Analyst for the Ministry of Social Development for just under two years. I worked largely in the child, family and community policy space, with a strong focus on youth justice through supporting the Youth Crime Action Plan. Through my work on the Youth Crime Action Plan, I was able to support young people in youth justice residences to actively engage and have their voices heard in policy design and decision making at every level.

At the beginning of this year I joined the team at the Office of the Children's Commissioner as Senior Advisor (Child and Youth Voice). I have Alex Martin, your current Deputy Head Girl to thank for my appointment as she was one of my Referees. I am loving being a member of Judge Andrew Becroft's team. As part of my role, I am currently leading the Child and Youth Voices Project, which is a national mechanism through which children and young people can exercise their right to have a say in matters that affect them, to raise awareness and increase youth engagement, and to bring children and young people's voices to the attention of national decision makers.

I'm really excited to have Maia Usherwood-Nosa as the key contact for this project at Otago Girls'. In my spare time I am always keen to explore new places, both here at home, and abroad. Which is lucky, given that my sister has made it her mission to share her skills across the world, and never fails to provide an exciting location for me to visit. I'm really grateful and very proud to be Otago Girls' Alumnus, alongside my sister Chloe Brown, my Grandma Rosemary Magrath and her sister Betty Miguel (Fyfe).

Averil was interested in talking to the girls about their experiences on World Challenge Expedition then shared her journey from finishing school to her current position with the Embassy.

Averil gave strong messages about working hard, developing good interpersonal skills and taking opportunities to make things happen. She left this final message; "Education is your pathway to success".
