International students add a global dimension and enrich the lives of both host school students and visiting school students by the friendships and connections they make here.

Learning has been significant and we enjoyed top results in New Zealand over all levels of NCEA and Scholarship when final results were released in February. International students are able to have NCEA recognised internationally for entrance to universities worldwide. Reflections from our Dean of International Students, Mrs Katherine Boomer



What a whirlwind start to the year! It was wonderful welcoming new international students to our school and seeing how so many of them were very keen to quickly join sporting and cultural groups. Their ability to adapt to life in Dunedin went smoothly and many were quickly making new friends and having new experiences.

We are extremely proud of the 2024 NCEA results from our students who have demonstrated how well they adjusted to New Zealand education and can excel in their chosen subjects. Providing such a wide variety of subjects at OGHS allows students to follow their passions all the way through high school and lead them into further study and careers.

Delighted is one word to describe how we feel when we get visits from former international students. Yuki Mitobe from Japan, who was here in 2019, popped in for a short visit. Yuki continued her high school and university study in Japan. Will and Well Chomchoei, along with their parents and grandparents from Thailand, surprised us when they turned up at the school gate. It was so wonderful to meet the family. They started with us in 2018 with Will in Year 11 and Well in Year 10, and finished in Year 13. They have both now completed their university degrees in New Zealand and will move to Australia to complete further study.

We held our annual barbeque for our international school community, then we had the Dunedin Mayoral





Welcome at Ōtākou Runaka marae where about 250 high school international students gathered to be welcomed by the mayor of Dunedin. It was a real Dunner Stunner of a day with clear blue skies and a calm harbour making the event more special.

Some other highlights have been the colourful sports day in February, croquet, ice skating, outdoor education and other subject outings, and Borland camp. I was lucky to go to Borland camp in Fiordland National Park, where I saw the young people enjoying the glorious scenery and taking on kayaking, rock climbing, hiking, downhill mountain biking, biology work, a campfire, as well as seeing a beautiful starry night sky.

The International Student Council has been newly formed, with students from different countries and cultures with a shared vision to enhance the lives of students at our school. They are a very keen group of outgoing young people who are interested in helping others and enjoying school life.

Students and teachers have been busy in Term Two with a huge variety of activities from cultural to sporting to academic. A lot of assessments were undertaken, including the Level One literacy and numeracy CAAs (common assessment activities), but there were also so many co and extra curricular activities. The school cross country event is always colourful and there are opportunities for all levels of participation. Swimming sports followed on and was once again full of colour, enthusiasm, and great displays of aquatic excellence. The last dressing up spectacle was our Library Day with the theme From Page to Screen where students and staff could dress up like a character from a novel or movie. It is always a highly-anticipated day and the fun of the costumes and laughter of the day was evident.





The Otago University and Otago Polytechnic Open Days provide insightful chances for the Year 13 students to attend some lectures and get a feel for life at those educational institutions. The Dunedin Careers Expo was attended by all Year 11s and they were interested in the number of options available to them. Year 11 Geography had their annual trip to Mount Cook where they were able to be part of the beautiful wonders of Mother Nature. Outdoor education classes continued to push the students with an array of physical (and mental) challenges throughout the term. All the Year Ten students attended a day trip to the stunningly located Puketeraki Marae at Karitane.

A number of our international students were part of the school choir and performed in the Big Sing competition in town. Fortunately, the choir was impressive and successful and will perform at the next stage. Unfortunately, those students have



returned to Germany and will not be singing again with the school. They even practised a song while waiting to see the little blue penguins at Taiaroa Head.

We had been out of the school hall for many weeks and it was very exciting to return there recently for our assemblies. Construction continues at the school with work presently being undertaken in the office area and the staffroom. We are looking

forward to the next stages and to the improved layout and usage of the areas.

Thursday 26 June was the Year 12 Formal which was held at Otago Museum. This is an event that our international students don't get to experience in their home countries so they jumped at the opportunity to don stunning dresses, hair, and make-up. I am not sure how many hundreds (or thousands) of photos and videos were taken that evening.

It is always sad when we have to farewell students when they return to their home countries. Many tears were shed when saying goodbye but they are also tears of happiness as it shows their time at our school has had a positive impact on them. We had a farewell party at the end of each term, as well as many little ones in class which often included cooking and treats. We wish everyone well for their studies back home and hope they return to see us one day.

We always look forward to welcoming new international students each term, and continue to see all students excel and create new and lasting memories.

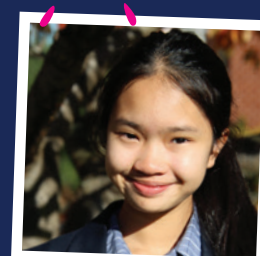
FAREWELL TO OUR LEAVING LEADERS TERM 2

6. Would you encourage other international students to study at OGHS and why?

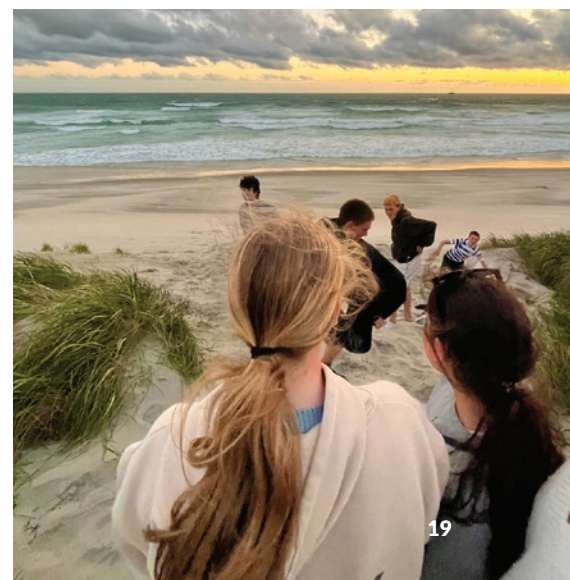
Yes, the school is very exciting with lots of events such as sports day, swimming, sports, fundraisers, and many more. Therefore, I would encourage others to study at OGHS.

Winner of Study Dunedin Ambassador Programme 2025: Chika Kajiyama



Our international student Chika Kajiyama has been selected as one of the winners of the Study Dunedin Ambassador Programme 2025. She has won \$1,000 from the Dunedin City Council to be spent during her year here in Dunedin. We are so proud of Chika for receiving this special award! Here are some excerpts from her insightful application.

I'd like to introduce myself. My name is Chika Kajiyama. I live in Fujikawaguchiko town in Japan which is very close to Mt. Fuji. This town has a lot of variation in temperature throughout the year. I think, in some ways, my town and Dunedin might be similar. In other ways, the animals and plants are very different, so I am looking forward to seeing these differences in person.

I joined the Japanese tea ceremony club at my high school and learned how to make Matcha, Japanese green tea. Matcha is a historical and cultural drink, and there are many rules to make it properly. I

would love to serve it to people in Dunedin.

My favourite subjects are English communication and PE. Also, I'm interested in art and design. I want to actively try subjects in Dunedin, and I want to try some others which might be different to Japan.

When I chose Dunedin, I was the most interested in the architecture of the city. For example, Dunedin railway station. I feel it looks like a palace. In Japan, I haven't seen a station shaped like this. One more is Otago Museum. I felt the colours and appearance blended in naturally. Also, I'm looking forward to learning there about Dunedin and New Zealand history, culture, and more.

When I studied the different regions of Japan in elementary school, my teacher told us to pay attention to the structure of the buildings in each area. Japan is as long as New Zealand from north to south, and because it is in a volcanic region, it has a lot of rugged terrain, and each region has a completely different climate. Areas with frequent typhoons have roofs that are resistant to rain and wind, while areas with heavy snowfall have the roofs that are built to withstand the weight of snow. One example, in Japan, Gassho-style Houses (steep thatched roof houses). This roof is used at in heavy snow areas. Also, this roof can catch snow and prevent collapse. The area near Mt. Fuji, where I live, is 1,000 meters above sea level, and winters are very cold. Old buildings are made of wood, but they are built to cope with the cold. In Kyoto, which is one of the most historical cities in Japan, the town was built in an orderly grid pattern more than 1,000 years ago. The Imperial Court was placed in the center of the grid, and people lived in townhouses built in the divided long, narrow spaces. What I have noticed in focusing on buildings and architecture is that climate and history determine buildings, townscapes, people's lives, and ways of thinking.

When I researched Dunedin, I was most interested in the architecture. For example, Dunedin railway station because the architecture was completely different from anything I had seen before. And I thought they were cool. Also, I'm interested in Winter Garden. The greenhouses are located in a more natural setting than in Japan, slightly separated by glass but integrated with nature, and the roofs look like umbrellas, which I thought were unique features not found in Japanese botanical gardens. The fact that there are buildings that I have never seen before means that Dunedin has a different culture, history, and way of thinking from



Japan. I would like to see the buildings and streets of Dunedin in person, live there for a year, have conversations with the people of Dunedin who live there, and gain new ideas and perspectives.

Ever since elementary school, I have wanted to realise a world where everyone lives with a smile. However, I have not yet determined what I should do to achieve this. I believe that Dunedin has a culture and history that I have never experienced before. By getting to know this town and conversing with its people, I would like to gain new values and perspectives to help me better decide what I should do in the future.

At the moment all of my understanding is based on Japanese culture alone and I would like to combine the best of Japanese culture with the best of New Zealand's culture so that I can make decisions which are informed by two very differing cultures instead of just the one I'm familiar with now.

Firstly, I want to learn and understand the history, culture and thinking by immersing myself in everyday life, the building and streets of Dunedin which are of course completely different to what I am familiar with in Japan. Secondly, I would like the people of Dunedin to experience aspects of Japanese culture through myself and observe their reactions to better understand my own culture from someone else's perspective and re-evaluate all of the things I am too familiar with or take for granted in Japan. For this purpose, I would like to perform the Japanese tea-ceremony and make Matcha (Japanese green tea) and make sweets which go well with it for local people and engage in conversation with them.

Now that I have discovered the Study Dunedin Ambassador Programme 2025, I feel that this is a very attractive path to take in my personal development. Through experiencing first-hand New Zealand life and network expansions, this programme feels like a good fit for me. If I am lucky enough to be accepted, I intend to actively participate in the programme through cultural exchange with the intention of both cultures benefitting from this interaction and helping to spread knowledge and understanding of NZ culture in my own country.

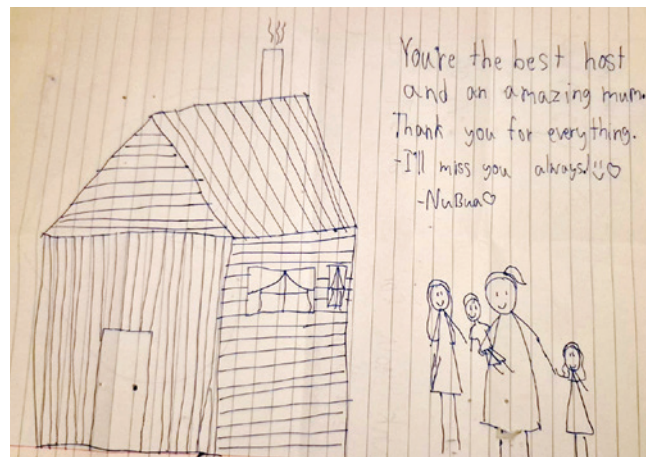

international student, I would highly recommend it as a learning experience for your children to learn about a different culture.

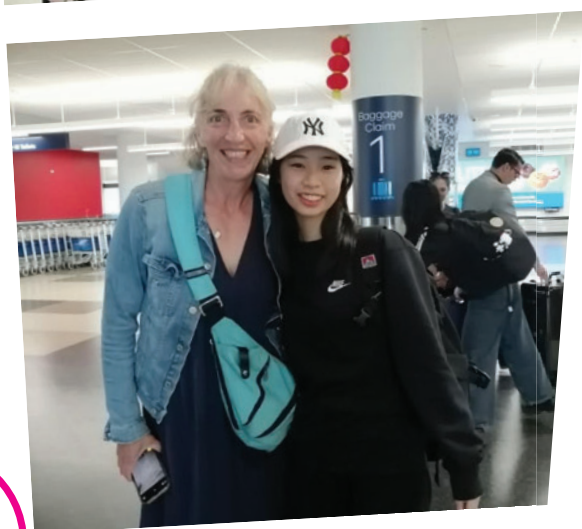

MOU supports seamless educational pathway for Otago Girls' High School international students



A new agreement between the University of Otago and Otago Girls' High School aims to create a seamless pathway between secondary and tertiary education for international students wanting to study in Dunedin.

In a region-first, the Memorandum of Understanding – signed today by Vice-Chancellor Grant Robertson and Otago Girls' High School Principal Bridget Davidson – encourages closer collaboration between the institutions with a particular focus on providing teaching and learning opportunities for the school's international students.

Under the agreement, the School's Department of International Students will work closely with the University's Pathway department to seamlessly transition their international students wanting to go onto tertiary study at Otago. Pathway| Te Huarahi offers university preparation programmes to assist all students (international and domestic) achieve university entrance in New Zealand.

Bridget says the agreement helps provide prospective international students and their parents an opportunity to chart a long-term educational pathway before joining the school.





“The parents of international students need this certainty when making decisions about where their child may go to live and study,” she says.

“The MOU is a win-win in that it provides this certainty, while also making both Otago Girls’ High School and the University of Otago a more attractive option in a competitive market.”

University of Otago Vice-Chancellor Hon Grant Roberston and Otago Girls’ High School Principal Bridget Davidson sign a memorandum of understanding aims to create a seamless pathway between secondary and tertiary education for international students wanting to study in Dunedin.

Grant says the MOU signing carries on the tradition of Otago being a place of many firsts.

“The University of Otago was New Zealand’s first university, while Otago Girls’ High School was the first state-run girls’ high school established in the southern hemisphere. Today our institutions are signing the first agreement of its kind in this region.

“It’s fantastic to work together in this way and highlight the region’s longstanding and outstanding reputation for educational excellence, at all levels, to an international market.

“Otago Girls’ High School international students going on to study at the University of Otago will also be eligible to apply for the generous and highly competitive suite of international scholarships we have on offer,” Grant says.

Otago Girls’ High School currently hosts about 50 international students each year.

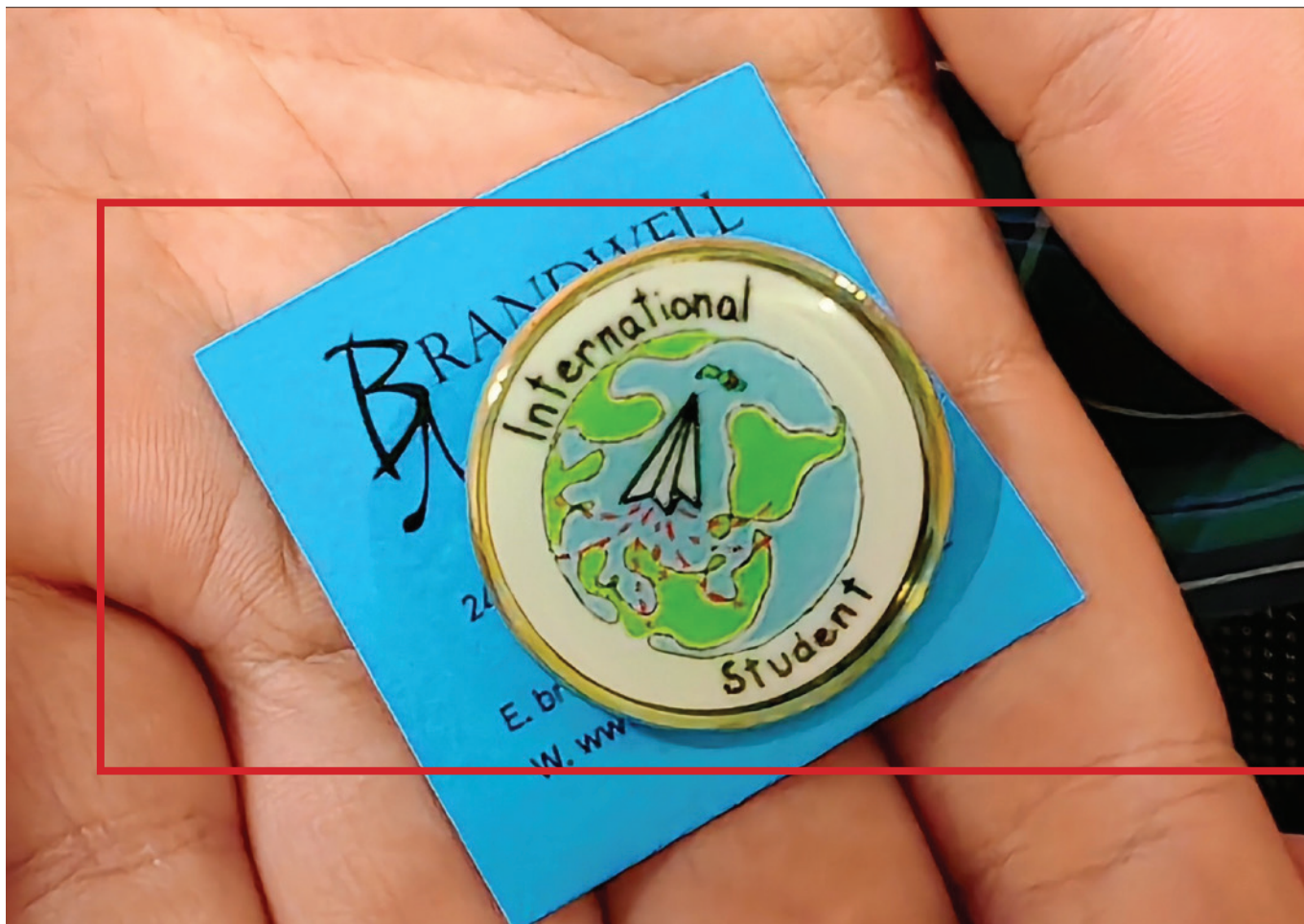
The University of Otago currently welcomes about 2,500 international students each year. Under Pae Tata, its strategic plan to 2030, the University plans to significantly increase those numbers over the coming years.

“Growing our international connections and student cohort adds depth and richness to our student experience, while also enhancing our global standing and reputation, and contributing to our financial sustainability,” Grant says.

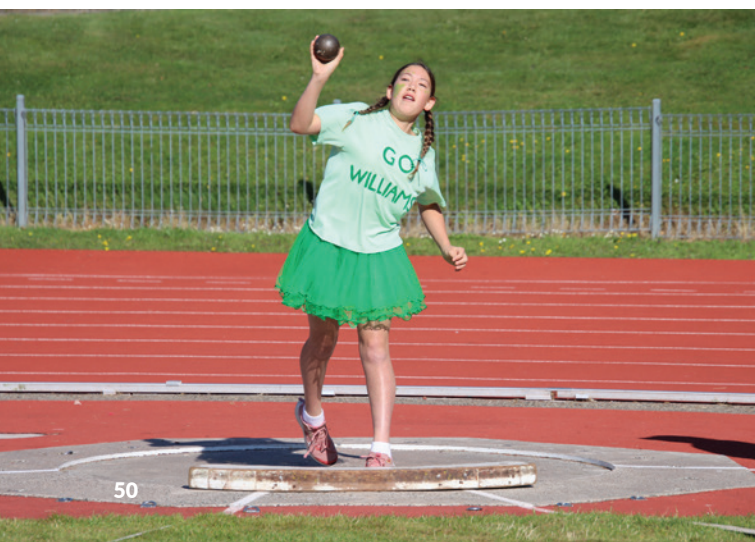
Luckily, we had a very strong start which allowed us to win the prefect vs. teacher relay.

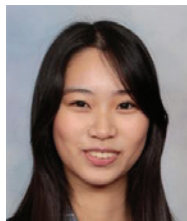

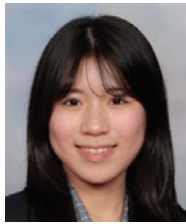
Overall, the two weeks holiday was incredibly well-spent, I had the chance to experience new things but most importantly, enjoy spending time with my family.

We wish you all the best for your exciting adventures ahead!



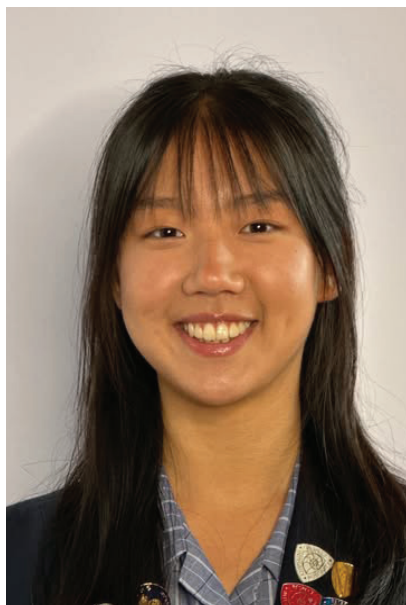
Lovely Visit from Former International Student Yuki Mitobe

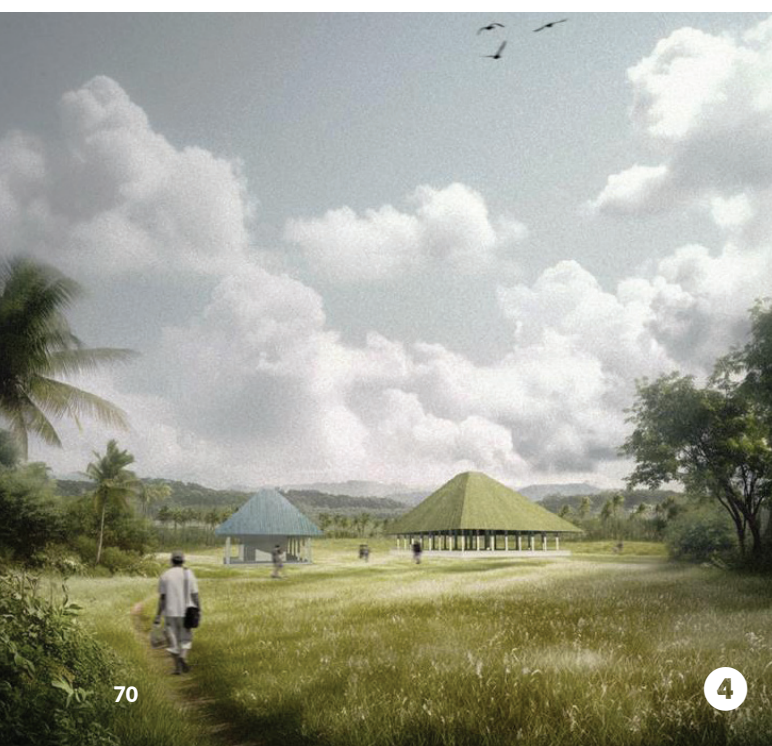
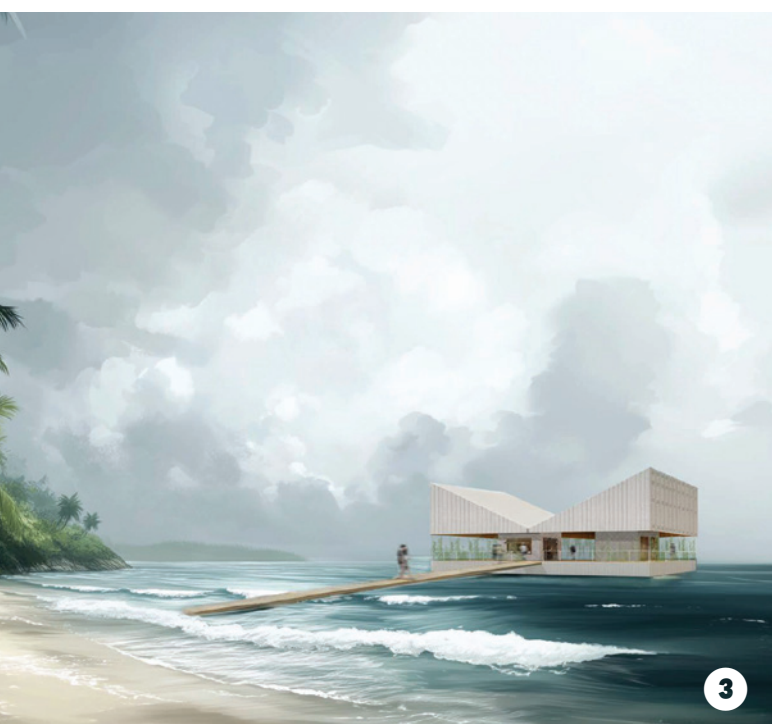


Former International Student Wins Major Design Award

2. The Fale Tele in a natural green to blend into the surrounding tropical foliage and serving as a space to gather and Talanoa; and the Fale Umu, the communal kitchen, in a deep ocean blue representing Sāmoa's enduring connection to the sea and food traditions.
3. Olo Matamata, a bold red tower functioning as a seed bank and a lookout post. It is symbolic of strength and resilience, built to withstand severe weather events and protect biodiversity by safeguarding native plant species.
4. Moana, which floats partially in the ocean, is painted in a soft white-cream hue. Designed to reflect sunlight and resist overheating, it is a forward-looking symbol of adaptability and survival in the face of rising sea levels, while also representing the openness and freedom of the sea and sky.



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
